

Message From The General Secretary

The second quarter of the year had many events. Thanks be to God that finally, we have been able to turn the curve on the Coronavirus pandemic complications on interactions and meetings. We thank God that the gift of vaccines has finally enabled us to function with some normalcy. I, therefore, urge leaders of Churches everywhere to encourage people to get vaccinated, since Coronavirus is still a challenge.

On this page, I want to say a bit about the planned All Africa Youth Congress which we have been planning for a long time, since right before the Coronavirus outbreak.Now we have the dates, the venue, and we are all gearing up for it. Many who have heard about it, think it is a great idea.

We want to bring together young adults, who we call the youth according to the definition of the African Union, meaning persons below the age of 35 years. They should have an experience of the beauty of Pan-Africanism. They should come to hear and contemplate on the theme: "AFRICA: MY HOME. MY FUTURE." The message is clear. 



The official application and registration for the All Africa Youth Congress closed on 30th June 2022. We received overwhelming applications. While the vetting and shortlisting process is currently ongoing, application and registration is still open to individuals, Churches, councils, and institutions who had requested an extension. In the meantime, you can continue interacting with the AAYC website https://allafricayouthcongress.org/ for more information about the Congress.

The plans for the AAYC are not halted with the shortlisting process, we highly encourage participants to be more proactive in the Pre-Congress activities. These include:

- Joining and participating in mobilization and popularization of the Congress as well as receiving updates through the respective AAYC National WhatsApp platforms.
- Applicants who indicated not having passports can follow up with their respective countries' registry as soon as possible.
- Those who indicated sponsorship from an organization can begin a follow-up and get a letter of commitment of sponsorship to the Congress.

The official opening ceremony of the AAYC is scheduled for 1st November 2022, and will be graced by His Excellency Chief Olusegun Obasanjo, former President of Nigeria, the Grand Patron of the Congress, and His Excellency Nana Akufo Addo, the President of Ghana (Host).

The Congress program is under review to accommodate current changes in confirmation of invited special guests and keynote speakers as well as the programing related details of the Congress.

Additionally, invitations to exhibitors, businesses, and partners interested in showcasing content during workshops and side events are ongoing. The All Africa Youth Congress welcomes the expression of interest for innovators, organizations, and partners with programs centered around the four thematic areas; Promoting Youth & African Patriotism, Campaigning for African Dignity, Advocating for Justice & Security, and Fostering Active Citizenship.

EPEPPA Visit to Sudan

The AACC, in collaboration with the World Council of Churches (WCC) and the Fellowship of Christian Councils and Churches in the Great Lakes and Horn of Africa (FECCLAHA), organized an Eminent Persons Ecumenical Programme for Peace in Africa (EPEPPA) visit to Sudan. Sudan continues to face challenges following the military coup of 25th October 2021. Civil strife and economic crisis have continued where the population is experiencing a lot of challenges.

As part of their endeavor for peace and stability for the region and the continent in general, the above-named organisations took the initiative for a solidarity visit to the churches, the government, and the people of Sudan. The Church in Sudan was encouraged to stand firm and keep its prophetic voice amidst the current political challenges. The delegation also met with the Minister of Religion in Sudan Dr. Abd al-Atr Ahmed Abbas, who welcomed the team with enthusiasm, recognized the role the church plays in the life of their country, and reiterated his ministry's commitment to work with the Church.

The delegation was also received by H.E. Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, Chairman of the Sovereign Council of the Republic of Sudan where they conveyed a message of peace: The Chairman appreciated the visit and considered it a sign of African solidarity.

Finally, the delegation met with the Norwegian Church Aid (NCA) Agency in Sudan, who committed to support the institutional capacity of the Sudan Council of Churches.

Learning and Exposure Visit to ACCORD in South Africa

The AACC organised an orientation session for some of the Eminent Persons through an experiential learning, exposure, and training at the African Centre for the Constructive Resolution of Disputes (ACCORD) in South Africa from 28th March 2022 to 1st April 2022.

During the training, participants interacted with the ACCORD leadership and staff where they learnt about the different approaches used by the ACCORD to bring creative African solutions to the challenges posed by conflict on the continent. In addition, there were panel discussions on peacebuilding efforts and processes, and visits to some historical sites (Voortrekker Monument, Freedom Park, constitutional Hill). They also discussed areas of future collaboration and engagements between the AACC and the ACCORD.

Lastly, during a dinner hosted by the ACCORD, the Eminent Persons interacted with dignitaries from the European Union, United Nations, and diplomats. The lessons learnt during this visit will contribute to strengthening the work of the AACC in Peace building.

Establishment of the AACC's Africa Faith Actors Network on Climate Justice

The AACC held a High-Level Continental Consultative Meeting on Climate Change in Nairobi, Kenya at the DTCC from 21st June 2022 to 23rd June 2022, under the theme: *"The Welfare of the Earth is our Welfare" Jeremiah 29:7*. The meeting drew delegates from the AACC members, religious leaders from different faiths, academia, Civil Society, the African Union, development partners, media, and interest groups such as women, youth, and persons with disabilities.

The delegates reflected on critical theological and technical issues related to climate change and noted that there were more areas of convergence than differences among people of different faiths when it comes to creation matters. This became a strategic platform for faith leaders and other critical technical stakeholders to learn and exchange ideas on climate change issues from a theological perspective. The major outcome of the meeting was the commissioning of the Africa Faith Actors Network on Climate Justice (AFAN-CJ). The main purpose of the AFAN-CJ is to amplify the work of the AACC thereby contributing to addressing the impact of climate change. The AFAN-CJ will also contribute to the coordination of the faith community's work on climate change at national, regional, and continental levels building toward the annual United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) processes. The network was officially commissioned by the AACC's General Secretary, Rev. Dr. Fidon Mwombeki.

AACC Heightens its Advocacy Role for Human Dignity and Justice in Africa

The General Secretary of the AACC, Rev. Dr. Fidon Mwombeki launched a new project on **"Enhancing** *Capacities of the AACC to heighten its Advocacy role for Human Dignity in the Continent*". The launch took place at the Hilton Hotel in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia from 3rd May 2022 to 4th May 2022. In attendance were participants from regions in the project's thematic areas identified, Faith Based Organisations, Civil Society Organisations, representatives from the African Union Commission and the AACC Staff.

The project's main development goal is to ensure that at the impact level, the AACC's coordinated lobby and advocacy work contributes to a developed, peaceful and secure Africa (Aspirations Nos. 3 (good governance, human rights, democracy), 4 (peace) and 6 (women and youth) of the African Union Agenda 2063).

This project will ensure a coordinated advocacy effort by the AACC and its members and other relevant stakeholders on migration, modern slavery, and human trafficking through the AACC Offices in Lomé and Addis Ababa.

Faith Leaders Advocacy Initiative Towards the East African Community (EAC)

The AACC in collaboration with the African Union Interfaith Dialogue Forum (AU-IFDF), the United Religions Initiative, and the Centre of Excellence in Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism (Intergovernmental Authority for Development) paid a courtesy advocacy visit to the EAC Secretariat in Arusha, Tanzania on 1st June 2022. At the EAC Secretariat, the delegation met with H.E Dr. Peter Mathuki, the Secretary General of EAC where they shared about the lobby and advocacy work of the AACC at the African Union.




The Untold Journey Podcast



The Untold Journey Episode 02: Seeking Justice is Personal.
